Application Forms for the 2005 Gang Show will be out in December.

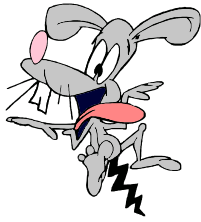
In the mean time the Production Team are busy getting the 2005 show's format and script written.

Funafuti is also trying to restart Scouting. We are asking our Leaders to Care and Share during November also. Well it has been a very busy month trying to bed things down for next year. Unfortunately our Training Calendar looks like it won't be delivered to you until early in the New Year. We will try to have a version on the State Website and the Regional Website prior to this. To help you with your planning contained in this Bulletin (see the Region Calendar – pages 7-8) is a full listing of what we will be offering at Glenrock in 2005. To help you understand what follows is a repeat of what I wrote a couple of months ago. This which should help you understand the new terminology. Please note we have eliminated the frustrating terminology of PCM (Preliminary Core Module) it will now be known as simply the Introductory Interview (commonsense to describe it for what it is).

Training Changes

Next year there will be a total revamp of the NSW Training Package. The following is the proposed overview as written (with some modification) by the State Commissioner for Adult Training & Development, Carol Cope. We now have Courses abbreviated to BL1, BL2 and BL3 (with sectional name prior to BL3 – eg JSBL3) & AL1, AL2 & AL3. Not confused already are you?

BL1 (Basic Leadership 1) was BCM – Residential weekend starting on Saturday morning and finishing Sunday afternoon.

BL2 (Basic Leadership 2) was Day 1 of Basic Sectional Techniques – Will now be a Residential weekend starting on Friday night and finishing Sunday Afternoon. This component will no longer be sectional and will be common to all.

BL3 (Basic Sectional Leadership 3) was BST – prefixed by sectional identification (sectional name in front for example Scout Section was SBST would now be SBL3). This is a Residential weekend starting on Friday night and finishing Sunday Afternoon

AL1 (Advanced Leadership 1) was ACM – Residential weekend starting on Friday evening finishing Sunday afternoon

AL2 (Advanced Leadership 2) (with sectional name in front eg JSAL2) was Sectional Outdoor Courses – Residential weekend starting on Friday evening finishing Sunday afternoon

AL3 (Advanced Leadership 3) – (with sectional name in front eg CSAL3) was ASL – Residential weekend starting on Friday night finishing Sunday afternoon.

If you didn't take my previous advice you will probably have a very busy 2005.

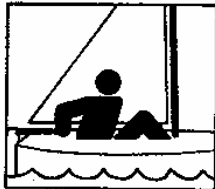
I agree its currently it's a somewhat rocky trail we travel so until next month take care as you travel along the Training Track.

The Netherlands held the first Agoonoree in 1949. The Dutch Scouters named the camp "Agoon" which comes from the Greek word "Agon", meaning special effort or to work hard for a successful purpose. Today Agoonoree is a major event in many of Australia's states bringing able and disabled Scouts and Guides together to share new experiences and learn from each other.

The first NSW Agoonoree was held in 1987 and to date there have been 14 Agoonorees.
