Make the Difference

Parents Can Help Children Learn From Disappointment

Parents can't spare children from disappointments in life. Nor should you want to. Learning to deal with rejection by a friend, not winning an election and other setbacks help kids cope later in life.

How **you** respond to your child's disappointments will greatly influence how well she learns to cope. Doing these things will help ensure your child learns to tolerate frustration and even grows from it:

- **Praise your child often.** Having a strong sense of self-worth helps your child think, "I can do things if I try".
- **Help your child anticipate** that things might not work out the way he/she wants. Show them how to explore options by playing "what if" games.
- **Don't assume you know how your child feels** - ask them. Their emotions might be quite different from how you would feel.
- **Take your child's disappointment seriously.** Listen closely and acknowledge their feelings of loss. Don't try to talk them out of their feelings.
- **Ask questions about what happened** - to help your child explore, understand and learn from the experience.
- **Don't try to fix everything** for your child. Don't blame the teacher or another child, or automatically pull your child out of an activity.
- **Say you are proud** of your child for trying.
- **Share your disappointments** and how you overcame them.

In short, talk to your child and don't be afraid to express your emotions/feelings with them. If you do not talk, you will never know what your child is thinking.

Games

Crown the Royal

Have one player, the "Royal", sit on a stool in the centre of a 3 metre circle on the ground or floor. Designate another

player as the “guard” and have him stay inside the circle to protect the Royal. The others are outside of the circle. They try to crown the Royal by hitting him below the waist with a volleyball. When a player crowns the Royal, he becomes the guard and the former guard becomes the Royal. The former Royal joins the group outside the circle and the game continues.

Human Pinball

PURPOSE

Here's your chance to be a flipper in a giant pinball machine—your dream come true! The lights and bells may be missing on our organic model, but there's plenty of action.

EQUIPMENT

All you need is a volleyball.

HOW TO PLAY

All players except one stand in a circle, facing outwards. Spread your legs as wide as comfortable until your feet are touching your neighbours' on either side. Everyone should bend down and swing their arms between their legs. This is what it feels like to be a pinball flipper.

The one non-flipper enters the circle as the movable target. The flippers try to hit the target by knocking a volleyball or rubber playground ball back and forth across the circle. Whoever hits the target gets one point and also gets to be the new target. Every time the ball goes out of the circle, the target scores a point. (However, the target's only job is to avoid the ball. Only flippers can flip it.)

Age-Old Secret

Ask someone to write down the number of the month they were born (January=1, February=2, etc.). Tell them to double it, add 5, multiply by 50 add they age, subtract 250. Have them read their answer aloud. The last two numbers will tell you their age and the remaining, the month in which they was born.

My gosh, this works! I was born in March, and you double that which = 6. Adding 5 makes it 11. Then multiply by 50 = 550. Okay, here we go, this could be a first, I am telling my age. After adding my age the number is 594. I am not making it that easy; you at least have to figure it out. When you subtract 250 from 594 you get 344.

All arrangements are going well and we can all look forward to a great week end.

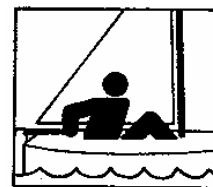

Hello from the Activities Team

In last months article I spoke about the need to have the Regional ‘Application to Attend a Course’ Form (Version HA1 10/04) completed & at the Regional Office on or before the closing date. It must be accompanied with the correct money. If it is not there by the closing date you can expect that the application will not be accepted. This includes Leaders as well as youth members.

If you are intending to run or have run a course within a District then you must complete an (Region) “Application to Run a Course” form. This must include the Course Leaders details, Assessors details and emergency contact details. Those courses will need to meet the Regions policies before being approved to run. This is to ensure that the courses are conducted in accordance with the guidelines that are in place.

It is worth noting that the Activities Team is here to assist all sections in delivering activities to their youth members. This also includes the leaders. If you are a leader and you would like have your youth members attend a course and you would like to have the skills to assist, then come along to a course or two in advance and gain the skills and experience. Note if you are a qualified leader (ie you have a CoAL) then you can attend most courses free of charge.

Looking at the Regional calendar there are two things I need to bring to your attention.

1. 3 & 4 June – This weekend in the calendar is indicated to be a Rock Instructor’s weekend. At the last activities meeting it was decided to make this **a weekend for all instructors (and party leaders)**. We are working on the program for the weekend currently. Please if you are an instructor then make every effort to attend this weekend.

There will be some theory, some play and a social event on the Saturday night.

2. Change of date. Abseiling Basic/Intermediate/Advanced which was scheduled for the 5 & 6 August has been put back one week to the **12 & 13 August**. This to move the abseiling away from the Region World Scout Day activity on 6 August.

Your Heritage Centre

The following was written by Lord Charles Rowallan – the Chief Scout of the British Commonwealth – during the late 1940s as a forward to a book written by Sir Percy Everett.

Forward – “ It is always interesting to know how an idea was first born, and when that idea has spread throughout the world, as Scouting has, its early days assume historic importance.

To millions of men, Scouting has brought happiness and satisfaction in Service. To millions, the memory of the Promise they made on Investiture has provided something stable, something which was a support in their hour of trial. From the very beginning, even before the Brownsea Island Camp, Sir Percy Everett was one of the closest associates of B-P. Who, then, is better fitted to write about the first ten years?

This book will have its place in the literature of Scouting and will, I hope, help to keep alive the spirit of enterprise and adventure, the simplicity and inspiration which are sometimes lost when a Movement becomes a recognised part of national life.”

Following the 1949 Australian Jamboree, Lord Rowallan took the opportunity to visit Newcastle. The plans were that he would visit Glenrock and join the Cubs and Scouts in their activities. Unfortunately, the weather changed our plans, as the track down was untrafficable! The Cubs went to the Christ Church Cathedral hall and the Scouts to the City Hall.

A night function was held in Scott’s (now DJs) in Hunter Street. Lord Rowallan addressed the gathering of Leaders and Layside.

In his address, he stressed the importance of the Law and Promise as a way of life. He stressed, very strongly, that we were “not here to turn out goody goodies. We are here to guide boys to become good citizens, to develop red blooded men who are capable of making a decision and have the guts to stick to it.”

The Regional Heritage Centre has a museum section as well as storage for memorabilia. Leaders can arrange for their sections to visit the Heritage Centre (located off Cooper Street, Fassifern, not far from the railway station)

by making an appointment with the Centre’s manager, Allan Victor.
