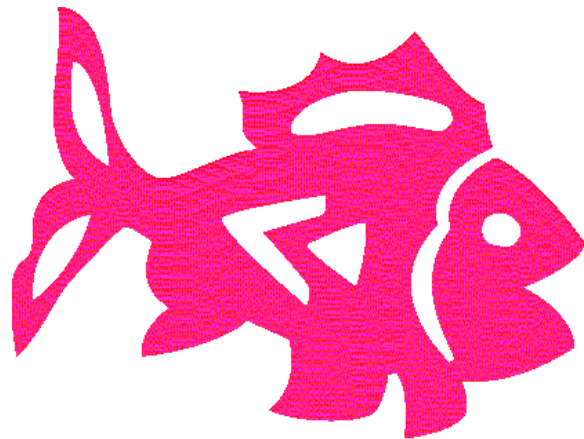
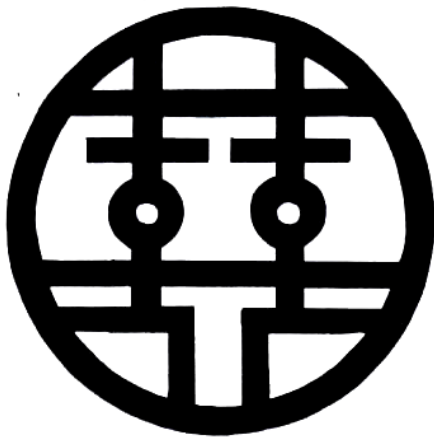

Coming In Activity: Chinese Paper Cutting

Paper Cutting is an ancient Chinese tradition that is still very popular today. You cut out shapes drawn on coloured paper and then hang the cut out on string. The shapes maybe very simple like a circle or hard like a bird. To make you own paper cut, draw a picture on a piece of paper and cut around it using paper scissors. The paper cut can then be glued to coloured cardboard and hang on the wall using string. You could try these pictures of the lion and the Chinese symbol for “double happiness”.



Game: Boules other wise known as pétanque, Is one of the most popular games in France.

Equipment: To play a Joey version of this game we used a Golf ball as the cochonnet and marked tennis ball with texta's to identify whose ball was whose.

1 Golf ball

1Tennis ball per Joey Scout

To Play:

Joey Scout Leader throws the cochonnet.

Once the cochonnet has been thrown the Joey Scouts from a mark, take turns throwing their boule as close as possible to the cochonnet.

Game: Nix Der Grube (water nymphs in the pit). This game is a traditional game played German Children.

Equipment: Blanket or sheet

To Play:

One Joey Scout is chosen as "it", this Joey scouts lies down in the centre of the room covered by the blanket or sheet (they are the water sprite). All the other Joey Scouts walk around the centre counting 1, 2, 3, etc. The water sprite jumps up when least expected and tries to catch one of the Joey Scouts. If caught that Joey Scout then becomes the water sprite and the game continues.

Game: Muk (silence). This game is played by Inuit children of North Canada & Alaska

Equipment: Nil

To Play:

Choose one Joey Scout to be "it". The Joey Scouts form a circle and the one that is "it" stands in the centre of the circle.

The Joey Scout in the centre of the circle chooses one Joey Scout from the circle and take then into the centre of the circle. The Joey Scout that is "it" stands in front of the person they have chosen and without saying anything must try and make this person laugh. They can pull faces etc but must not speak. If the person laughs they then become "it" and the came continues. If "it" can not make them laugh after a short time they must choose another person.

Game: Pull the lazy Stick. A traditional game played by Inuit boys

Equipment: Two sticks or pieces of wood tied together with a 30cm piece of rope.

To Play:

Players sit opposite each other, legs apart, holding one stick. The aim of the game is on the command go, to pull your opponent across into your space.

Game: Kangaroo Tail Tag Played by Australian Joey Scouts

Equipment: Tails made from material (crepe paper also works fine)

To Play:

Divide Mob into two, one half have tails tucked into their clothes and the other half are without. On a signal the Joeys need to hop around the hall trying to either catch a tail or avoid their tail being caught. When a tail is successfully tagged the Joey pair go to a Leader and the roles are reversed.

Game: The Door Keeper. This game is played by children from Afghanistan usually in the street using a soft ball.

Equipment: A soft Ball

To Play:

All the Joey Scouts stand in a circle with their legs apart and their feet touching the next Joey Scouts feet. One player (this could start with the leader) stands in the middle with the ball. The person in the centre rolls the ball trying to make it through the legs of the Joey Scouts in the circle. The players in the circle try to stop the ball by quickly closing their legs. If the ball passes through the legs of a player they stand out of the circle (they can be used to collect the ball if it goes through the legs of other players). When everyone is out, the game starts again.

Game: Tobi Koshi (Leap Frog) Tobi Koshi is the name for Leap Frog played in Japan but enjoyed all over the world.

Equipment: Nil

To Play:

Divide the Joey Scouts into two or three teams next to each other at one end of the hall. The first member of the team, crouch down (making the best croaking sound they can). The other team members leap over the crouched Joey Scout and they too crouch down for the team members behind to leap over etc. When all of the team is crouched the Joey Scout at the rear then leaps over the team and so on, until the whole team makes it to the other end of the hall.
