How many meals are you taking and what is the menu. Include emergency food and water.

## Notes for Scout Leader

1. The examiner must have both party leader and assistant pass the requirements of the interview.
2. This interview form must be signed by the District Scout Leader, before the hike can commence.
3. This interview form is to submitted with the hike log, and a copy kept by the Scout leader. This is ensure Parent “Informed Consent” on the A1 is a reassuring and accurate assessment of the Scout.
4. It is recommended that a Preliminary Hike Course is attended, BUT NOT compulsory, as Scout leaders have various skill sets, and may be capable of teaching the requirements. The Regional Coordinator Bushwalking ( Keith Randall as at July 2010) can sign this off, on recommendation by Scout Leader AND Green Cord Hike Examiner.
5. It is important that all members of the hike party have sufficient experience to cope with a 30 kilometre hike. Have attended a Blue Cord hike, should be experienced as a minimum.
6. It must be made clear, that the hike leader is in charge and responsible for making the major decisions. The Hike Assistant is there to support the Hike Leader.
